Promote RESPONSIBILITY in your child with these simple strategies ~

Young children are still developing their ability to store information. So they sometimes forget their books, their homework and even their lunches! It's tempting to keep track of your child's things for them, but this won't help them in the long run. Success in school will depend on the ability to take responsibility for yourself and your belongings.

Here are some things that will help your child become more responsible:

Write down what you expect your child to do. Post lists of responsibilities, weekly chores, and items they need for school.

Ask your child to check off tasks when completed. They can put a "question mark" next to a task if they need your help.

Help your child figure out where to store their things when they're not using them.

Set a good example. Have a designated spot for your keys and wallet. Check your calendar to prepare for the next day.

Show your child how to keep track of activities and assignments on their own weekly calendar.

Let your child experience the consequences of forgetting. Don't bring their homework to school if they forget it.

Let your child experience the consequences of losing an item. If they can't find their library book, expect them to pay the fine.

Praise your child when they demonstrate responsibility and doing what they're supposed to do!
