HEALTH RISK BEHAVIORS

Fact:

In the United States, 70% of all deaths among youth and young adults aged 10-24 years result from four causes:

- 23% Motor-vehicle crashes
- 18% Other unintentional injuries
- 15% Homicide
- **15**% Suicide

Contribution	Doing good things for those around you; serving your community		

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
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

Trends in Teen Births 1991-2012

	Total Teen Births	% Change	% Unmarried
1991	531,591		68.8%
2005	414,593	-34%	83.0%
2006	435,436	3%	84.2%
2007	451,094	2%	85.5%
2010	372,252	-9%	88.1%
2011	329,797	-8%	87.2%
2012	305,420	-6%	89%

Good News! 52% decrease since 1991!!!

Why has the teen birth rate decreased?

Less Teens Having Sex? YES!!!

- 57% of females aged
 15-19 years had never
 had sex- an increase
 from 49% in 1995¹
- 73% of females aged
 15-17 years had never
 had sex¹





FIGURE 4. Never-married females and males aged 15-19 who have ever had sexual intercourse: United States, 1988-2010.



If a Girl Gets Pregnant, She Might . . .


- Be a single mom

He may not have a choice!




Unmarried Teen Birth Rates, 1950-2008

Consequences for the Children of Adolescent Mothers

More likely to

- be born premature and to have low birthweight babies
- suffer from poor health
- grow up in a house without a father
- run away from home

Consequences for the Children of Adolescent Mothers

- Far more likely to be physically abused, abandoned, or neglected
- Perform much worse in school
- Daughters more likely to become teenage moms
- Sons more likely to be imprisoned

Consequences for Adolescent Mothers and Fathers

- Lower levels of education
- Higher rates of single parenthood
- Majority live in poverty or on welfare



Decreasing teen pregnancy is an important socioeconomic issue



Teens & Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STDs)



Sexually active teens have the highest STD rate.



Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STDs)

- Of all infections that are reported to the CDC, the most common types are STDs
- 18.9 million new cases of STDs per year
- Over 9 million STDs in 15 to 24 year olds



Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STDs)

According to the CDC, adolescents are at higher risk for acquiring STDs than adults:

- multiple sexual partners
- high risk partners
- more susceptible to infection

Sexually Transmitted Diseases

Bacteria

- Chlamydia
- Gonorrhea
- Syphilis

Protozoa

Trichomoniasis

Viruses

- Herpes Simplex Virus (HSV)
- Human Papillomavirus (HPV)
- Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV)



MOST PEOPLE INFECTED WITH STDs DON'T EVEN KNOW IT!



STDs: No symptoms

- Chlamydia: 75% of girls & 50% of boys
- HSV Type 2: 90%
- HPV: over 90%
- HIV: approx. 25% do not know they are infected; most are asymptomatic for years before developing symptoms



STDs can cause problems

- Precancer / cancer: cervix, anus, penis, vulva, mouth, & throat
- Socioeconomic detriment
- Psychological sequelae

- Tubal pregnancy
- Infertility
- Legal ramifications
- Pain, even death



What does the law have to say about teens & sex?



What is sexual contact?

Any touching of the anus, breast, or any part of the genitals of another person with intent to arouse or gratify the sexual desire of any person (Texas Penal Code 21.01)


Why do teens need to know about the laws on sex

- to make informed decisions about sexual behavior.
- to understand what sexual activities are against the law.

Each state has laws regarding sexual activity.

Example: Texas Laws

 You have to be 17 years old to legally consent to sex

 Sex with a child 13 years old or younger is aggravated sexual assault (statutory rape)

Sexual Abuse: The Unfortunate Reality

- Indecency
- Child pornography
- Date rape

- Incest
- Fondling
- Forced sex

1 in 3 girls and 1 in 6 boys will be sexually abused by age 18



Are Teens Capable of Handling All the Consequences of Sex



Emotional Consequences

- Sexually active girls:
 - more than 3x as likely to be depressed
 - nearly 3x more likely to attempt suicide

- Sexually active boys:
 - more than 2x as likely to be depressed
 - 8x more likely to attempt suicide





Emotional Consequences

Sex & drug behavior predicted increased likelihood of depression, but depression did not predict behavior.

N= 3,491 from Wave 1 ('95) & then 1 yr later, Wave 2



When it comes to your decisions about sex, who is most influential?




The Good News

- Fewer teenagers today are having sexual intercourse compared to years ago
- The teen pregnancy rate has gone down
 - decreased births
 - decreased abortions
- Decreased Herpes type 2 in teens

What Teens Say About Sex

National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy

- 60% of all sexually experienced teens said they wish they had waited longer to have sex
- 75% of teens do not think it's embarrassing for high school teens to admit they are virgins

Healthy Messages for Children

- No matter what your past regarding sex, what do you want for your children
- Renewed abstinence it's never too late to make a fresh start
